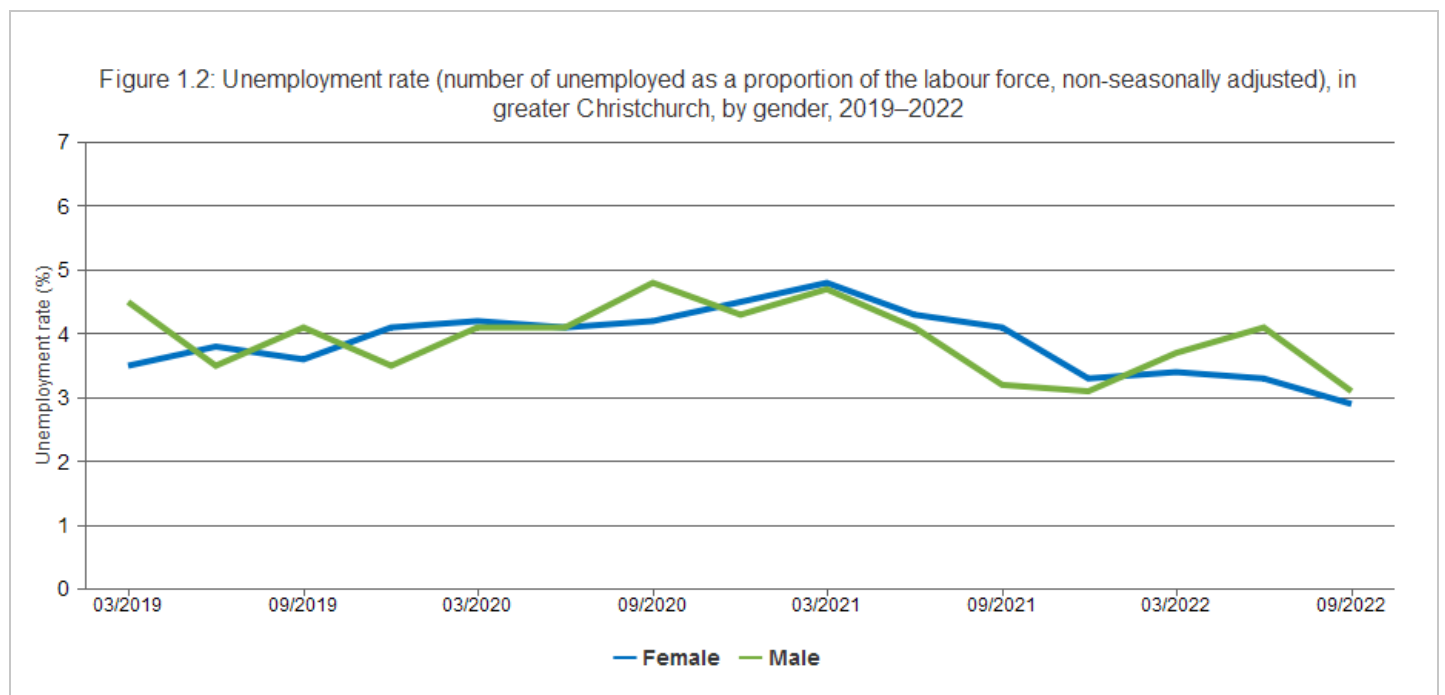


Unemployment rate: Breakdown by gender

The figure shows no substantial differences between the female and male unemployment rate (non-seasonally adjusted) in greater Christchurch, 2019 to 2022 (female, 2.9% and male 3.1% in 2022).
