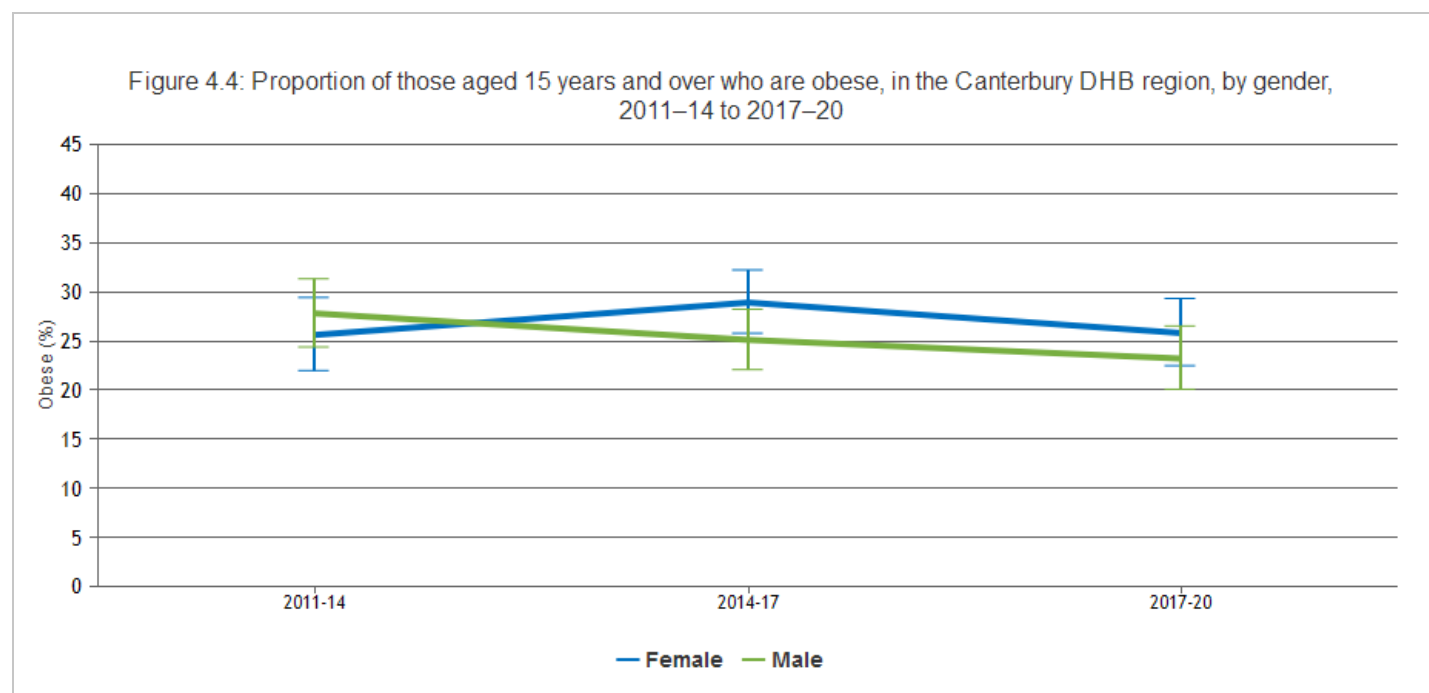


Obesity: Breakdown by gender

The figure shows that statistically similar proportions of female and male respondents, aged 15 years and over, are obese in the Canterbury DHB region (25.8% and 23.2% respectively, for 2017–20).
